





- Global CBPR & Global PRP provide a multilateral solution



Characteristics of Global CBPR & PRP



- Voluntary
- Enforceable
- > Flexible
- Multilateral
- Accountability-based
- Co-exist with other transfer mechanisms



What are Global CBPR & Global PRP? DATA TRANSFER MECHANISMS AND PRIVACY COMPLIANCE PROGRAMS



- ✓ CROSS-BORDER PRIVACY RULES (CBPR)
- ✓ PRIVACY RECOGNITION FOR PROCESSORS (PRP)
 - Developed by APEC in 2011 (CBPR) and 2015 (PRP)
 - Operationalize Privacy Principles




- Established in 2022
- Includes all nine members of the APEC CBPR System:
 - Australia, Canada, Japan, Republic of Korea, Mexico,
 Philippines, Singapore, Chinese Taipei, United States
- Enables other, non-APEC countries to join
 - ASSOCIATE MEMBERS: Bermuda, Dubai International Financial Centre, Mauritius, and the United Kingdom
 - APPLICATIONS FORTHCOMING: Nigeria, Thailand, Malaysia

CERTIFICATION PROCESS





Global CBPR as an Accountability & Compliance Mechanism

Enables companies to build a systematic privacy management program, verify and demonstrate compliance through third-party certifications

Accountability and compliance with local law



Including with data transfer requirements



Making Global CBPR Multilateral and Interoperable MAP LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Map Global CBPR to other privacy laws / frameworks



Identify gaps



Consider bridging mechanisms

Joining the Global CBPR (or bridging data transfer mechanisms to the Global CBPR) requires the ability to enforce or recognize the Global CBPR under one's own law or transfer regime

Requires comparing/mapping the Global CBPR requirements to one's own law or transfer regime Identify any specific substantive requirements not included in the Global CBPR or counterpart law

Consider whether bridging mechanisms for gaps are needed

Consider whether Global CBPR are enforceable via authority to enforce public promises (misrepresentation/deception)

Several options exist to bridge Global CBPR requirements and other privacy laws and frameworks



Global CBPR & Global PRP ROLES OF PRINCIPAL STAKEHOLDERS

Applicant Jurisdictions

Identify relevant laws and regulations to enforce the Program Requirements

Identify DPA to provide backstop enforcement

(mapping exercise as part of membership application)

Certified Organizations

Ensure that their data protection and privacy programs comply with the Program Requirements

(e.g., intake questionnaire as part of certification process)

Accountability Agents

Certify that applicant's privacy policies and practices align with Global CBPR/Global PRP Program Requirements

Monitor and assist with enforcement of the Program Requirements



Global CBPR & Global PRP ACCOUNTABILITY AGENTS

Nominated by country in which AA is to serve; approved by Forum members

Must meet recognition criteria established by Forum members

Subject to jurisdiction of the privacy enforcement authority

Certify and monitor participating organizations' privacy policies and practices to ensure compliance

Global Cooperation Arrangement for Privacy Enforcement (CAPE)

An arrangement where privacy enforcement authorities cooperate on cross-border data protection and privacy enforcement

April 2024: Bermuda, Dubai, and the UK joined the Global CAPE Facilitates information sharing among the Forum's privacy enforcement authorities Provide mechanisms to promote effective cross-border cooperation between privacy enforcement authorities Facilitate privacy enforcement authorities' cooperation in enforcing the Global CBPR and Global PRP Systems requirements **Encourage information sharing and cooperation with privacy** enforcement authorities globally
